Want to know ahead of time which shows to watch? Become a Healthier Version of You: Living Better Can Reduce the Risk of Stroke

Many people start the New Year with resolutions to eat healthier and exercise more, but you can make simple healthy lifestyle changes at any time to help reduce the risk of stroke – the fifth cause of death and a leading cause of adult disability in the U.S. On average, someone in the U.S. suffers a stroke every 40 seconds, and nearly 795,000 people suffer a new or recurrent stroke each year. To help you reduce the risk for stroke, the experts recommend exercising, eating nutritious meals, getting a good night's sleep and quitting smoking.

High Blood Pressure and Heart Disease

High blood pressure, also known as hypertension, is a leading cause of heart disease and the biggest risk factor for stroke because it damages the lining of the arteries, making them more susceptible to plaque buildup. The buildup narrows the arteries leading to the heart and brain. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), nearly half of all adults in the U.S. have high blood pressure but only a quarter of these adults have their condition under control.

"Physical activity for 30 minutes a day, five days a week, can help lower your blood pressure and reduce your risk of stroke," said Maria Bartman, BSN, RN, CEN, stroke coordinator at Saint Peter's and chair of Saint Peter's Stroke Committee. "If 30 minutes seems too intimidating of a goal, start by doing what's manageable based on your physical abil-

ity or schedule and build your way up."

Proper nutrition can also reduce high blood pressure and the risk of stroke.

"For a healthier lifestyle, consume a diet that includes fish, lean protein, low-fat dairy, and is high in fiber by including fruits, vegetables, beans, nuts and whole grains," said Laura Vetter, RDN, CDCES, outpatient nutritionist at Saint Peter's. "By reading labels and making healthy choices at the grocery store, you will incorporate nutritious foods into your diet."

Lack of Sleep

Not getting enough sleep each night can increase the risk of stroke. The CDC reports that hypertension, stroke, coronary heart disease and irregular heartbeats have been found to be more common among those with sleep disorders than those without sleep abnormalities. Having trouble sleeping? The Center for Sleep and Breathing Disorders at Saint Peter's University Hospital offers testing, diagnosis and treatment for sleep disorders, such as sleep apnea.

Tobacco Use

Smoking tobacco increases the risk of stroke, making quitting one of the most effective ways to improve health and quality of life. Saint Peter's tobacco cessation specialists are here to help people make a life-changing and life-saving decision. Ready to break the habit? Call Saint Peter's tobacco cessation line at 732.339.7848.

Diabetes

Adults with diabetes are twice as likely to have heart

disease or a stroke compared to others.

People with diabetes may avoid or delay the development of heart and blood vessel disease by managing their risk factors. Your health care team can do periodic testing to assess whether you have developed any of the risk factors associated with cardiovascular disease and stroke. The Thyroid and Diabetes Center at Saint Peter's is comprised of a multidisciplinary team led by dedicated endocrinologists with expertise in diabetes who offer individualized treatment plans for each patient with diabetes, including diabetes self-management education* and nutrition recommendations from the Center's certified diabetes educators.

Time=Brain

Time is of the essence when it comes to stroke. Early stroke detection and treatment are key to improving survival, minimizing disability and reducing recovery times.

BALANCE-Does the person have a sudden loss of balance?

EYES-Are they experiencing blurred or double vision in one or both eyes?

FACE-Ask them to smile- does one side of their face droop?

ARMS-Ask them to raise both arms- does one arm drift downward?

SPEECH-Ask them to repeat a simple phrase- is the speech slurred or strange?

TIME-If you see ANY of these signs, call 9-1-1!

If you have any symptoms of a stroke, or notice a loved one experiencing symptoms, call 911!

Clearbrook Computer Group

On January 5th through the 7th Las Vegas was home to the 56th Consumer Electronics Show (CES). After an all-digital event in 2021 and a dreary in-person show last year, CES finally was back to normal in 2023. In addition to improved hardware like sleek new laptops, foldable smart phones and new solid-state drives with 13 Gigabyte read/write capability there were lots of innovation on display. The coolest part of CES is the wealth of new product designs.

One such new product is the Lenovo ThinkBook Plus Twist. It's a 13.3-inch laptop with both a normal display and a second 12-inch color ink display on the reverse side. With a center post hinge that allows horizontal rotation between front and back displays, the Twist lets you use the regular display for most work and provides the option to switch to E-Ink to save battery life, rest your eyes from bright screens, or just use the machine as an E reader or a notepad. Another attention grabber at CES was the 93-inch LG wireless TV. The new wireless TV uses a built-in receiver in the screen, paired with the LG Zero Connect box which wirelessly transmits a 4K video signal along with multiple audio formats. LG's new Zero Connect technology, can broadcast HDMI-quality signal from up to 30 feet from the TV. As a result, aside from the power cord, the TV is cable-free. With a 30-foot range, you can set up other devices like Blu-ray players, game consoles, or a cable TV set-top box on one side of a room, with the TV mounted elsewhere. If you are into futuristic devices the Dyson Zone Air-Purifying Noise Cancelling headphones meet that requirement. This marks Dyson's first venture into both audio and wearable technology. The Zone is the first air purifier designed specifically for the face. The device, aims to combat outdoor air and noise pollution. Inside each ear cup is a tiny compressor motor

and a dual-layer air filter that promises to catch inhalable particles and noxious gases. A duct on each earcup allows clean air to flow into the visor, which sits around the lower half of your face without touching it.

Much of the tech at CES is ready for primetime, but there also was a glimpse of the big ideas that may or may not come to fruition. Some of the most intriguing concepts from the show were cars provided by automobile makers Chrysler, Dodge, Peugeot and BMW. Honda and Sony have a new venture called Sony Honda Mobility that displayed an Electric Vehicle (EV) under the brand name Afeela. The idea is that the cars will eventually be able to drive themselves, allowing passengers to relax with content created by Sony, like games, movies, and even AR-like experiences. With these types of products on the drawing boards, 2023 and subsequent years should be interesting from a technology point of view.

It's Freezing Outside

This may be informing too late for some, but it is cold enough for water pipes to freeze. Disconnect your hoses and sprinklers that are connected to the outside wall hydrant (the valve on the side and or in front of your unit).

Make sure you know where the main shut off valve is in your house and that you know how to shut off the water. If it is difficult to turn or in a location that is not accessible, consider calling a plumber to have it moved.

Know where the outside curb box is (the outside shut off) and that it is uncovered and accessible. Remove shrubs or ground cover so that it can be found quickly. Damage to your unit doubles and triples every minute that you waste getting the water shut off.

Find a plumber or two.

Keep their numbers readily available. In freezing weather the plumber will be too busy to get to you immediately. Be prepared to be without water until they get to you. Knowing how to shut off your water on your own can save you from a lot of grief.

Remember insulating pipes does not prevent freezing. It just takes a little longer for a disaster to happen. Be prepared. Know what to do. Have a good disaster plan. Don't allow replaced pipes to be installed in unheated places like the attic or outside walls.

If you are leaving for any extended period of time, winterize the house, shut off the water. In a bad storm the power may go out for an extended period of time. Shut off the water, leave all the faucets open to allow for ice expansion.

Referendum Presentation Scheduled by League of Women Voters

 A presentation on the upcoming school construction referendum has been scheduled by the League of Women Voters for Monday, February 27. The information, to be presented by school officials, will be held at the Municipal Building courtroom at 1 pm.
 The actual vote is scheduled for Tuesday, March 14. The Middlesex County Board of Elections will coordinate voting and will announce polling places and vote-by-mail procedures. Originally planned for an April election, the Board of Education was advised that the date needed to be moved forward one month or be delayed to September.
 The referendum proposes additions to both the middle and high schools and a large addition and renovation to Applegarth School, currently an elementary facility. The Applegarth building was constructed in 1936 but has had minimal renovations over the past ninety years. There is concern that the infrastructure may require repairs that have not been fully anticipated.
 The projected cost of the referendum is \$103 million. It is expected that property taxes will increase about \$215 per year based on the average home value of \$331,000 in the township.

The public is urged to attend this presentation or another before the election date in March. The meeting is open to the public. League membership is not required to attend. Supporting our students in safer facilities should be a priority for all residents. Detailed information will also be available on the Board of Education website.

 Recently, the Monroe Township Police Department has been receiving reports about a new phone scam.

If you are leaving for any extended period, shut off the water and winterize the house. Leave all faucets open to allow for ice expansion. Keep thermostats set to 55 degrees.

During severe storms, we may experience power outages. Again, it pays to be prepared with batteries, charged phones, prescrip-

This is something we should all take advantage of as our homes are completely electric. https://www.firstenergycorp.com/save_energy/save_energy_new_jersey.html. Choose "For the Home" where you will find appliance rebates (\$200-400+) per appliance, Appliance Recycling, Energy Efficiency Kits, a Home Energy Analyzer, and many other programs. Also, if you register with your account number, JCP&L will send you a package of free light bulbs and a surge protector. We can always use these.

Before you know it, spring will be with us. Your Board of Directors is starting to get ready for it. We'll be doing a walkthrough of the entire Section in early March to review and examine all our homes for roofs, driveways, gutters, etc. to see what work needs to be done going forward.

Trash – another reminder – we have placed white lattice borders around the Comcast cable boxes in most of our Section to make them more esthetically pleasing. These are NOT trash receptacles and why anyone

Also, if there is a need to use dumpsters, DO NOT have any put on the driveways before informing and having an inspection done with the Section Board representative.

Maintenance Requests

If you have maintenance requests, please fill out a Section 8 - Work Assignment Sheet. Unless it is an emergency, please do not call because we do not want verbal requests. We use the Work Assignment Sheet as an audit trail. These forms are now located in the file room of the Administration Building - on the right hand side in the center cubby. They can also be returned to the same location. The form is also available on the Clearbrook-NJ.com website. You need to LOG-IN, (if you don't have your password information, log on and follow the prompts). Then go to CONTACTS. Once there, go to SECTION 8, then scroll down until you see the RED BUTTON. Click on this button to view and print the Work Assignment Sheet.

(I put this in every month, for our new residents or just in case you misplace the directions to access.)

Note from CCA Administration Office:

For those of you who are leaving the community for an extended period during the winter season, please complete the Winter Residence Form. It's published in the Courier, available at the Administration office and is on the website portal as an e-form.

Please complete the form online or return it to the Administration Office before your departure. This information is required in order for you to receive the Section Election Call for Candidates, to calculate occupancy for Monroe Township and most importantly, for the office to have in case of emergency.

Notes from the President

With the cold weather many folks have plumbing issues. If your bathrooms are backing up or not draining or you have no heat/hot water, etc, do not call the Board members. Here is the process for anyone experiencing plumbing / hot water heating issues within their unit. Call a plumber. Below are three names of plumbers the Section has

used in the past. Anytime Plumbing in Jamesburg, 732 390 9955 or 732 238 8788, Redline Plumbing, 732 616 7260 or Plumbing Solutions, 609 490 9774.

If, and only if, the plumber is unable to clear the problem, then you may call the Board.

Please remember to put your cars in the garage if the forecast is snow. The snow removal vendor will not clear your driveways if the car(s) are parked in the driveway. Also, remember that the CCA provides calcium chloride pellets that you can pick up from either the Admin building parking lot or the Cultural Center parking lot to protect your driveways from icing. Please do not use sodium chloride, because it invalidates our driveway warranties.

When walking your dogs, please remember to pick up after them, especially in the common areas. Additionally, when you see garbage in the streets, please take the time to pick it up and place it in a garbage can. Let's keep our streets and neighborhood clean!

Snow Clearance Procedures



All Snowstorms:

During all snowstorms the following snow clearance procedures will be followed. As per contract, during typical storms (15 inches or less), snow should be cleared from all driveways and walkways within 24 hours after a snowfall concludes. In the event of a larger snowstorm or blizzard conditions, clearance may take longer—at least 48 hours from the time the snowfall stops. Clearance of snow/ice *will not* take place in the community unless the accumulation reaches more than two (2) inches.*

* When snow and ice accumulation is less than 2 inches, the Snow Contractor shall, upon authorization from Association's management, commence with the tipping of driveways (clearing of the snow/ice from the bottom of the driveways).

Preparation Prior to an Upcoming Snowfall:

The Association takes the following steps in anticipation of severe weather conditions:

1. The General Manager and the snow contractor's Operations Manager are in constant communication with each other to determine the best time to call the snow contractor to send its crews to the Property.
2. The General Manager makes a determination based on the type and amount of snow predicted and the current temperature on whether or not to salt our roads.

Staff/Equipment:

The current CCA snow contractor has the following on site at the beginning of a snowstorm:

1. 40 to 50 laborers with shovels and snow blowers
2. 8 to 10 pick-up/dump trucks with plows
3. 12 to 15 front end loader type tractors for driveways

Plowing of Roads:

Once the snow reaches a depth of two inches, the plows begin to clear the snow from all the roads in Clearbrook. This includes:

1. Streets
2. Cul-de-sacs
3. Entry Roads (main, north and east gates)
4. Maintenance Service Road
5. Path in the Clubhouse Parking Lot
6. Path in the Cultural Center Parking Lot

Snow Removal Procedure

After the Snowfall Ceases:

Once the snow stops, all roadways will be cleared 12" from the curb on each side of the road except where mailboxes, driveways, storm drains and fire hydrants are located. Driveway and walkway clearing will also begin when the snowfall stops.

The community is divided into five areas, each area worked by a different team for the snow clearing process. Teams are rotated throughout the season to start in different sections.

All snow is cleared from the following:

1. All walkways at apartment complexes, Devons, Cambridges and all sidewalks to individual units including the front door to the garage door across the atrium for Braeburns.
2. All primary entrance walks at main entrance, Clubhouse and Cultural Center
3. All driveways and parking lots throughout the community, including the Clubhouse and Cultural Center
4. All dumpster areas, fire hydrants, mailboxes and storm drains
5. All breakouts leading from sidewalks to roads

Once all areas are completed, follow up will be performed as needed on missed or problem areas.

There **will be no special consideration** for working residents, residents leaving on a trip or residents with doctor's appointments not deemed a medical emergency.

** Driveways will not be cleared of snow if a vehicle is parked on the driveway. The only exception to this is if a driveway is shared by two owners. We do ask that the owner with a vehicle on the driveway park as close to the opposite side of the driveway furthest away from the other owner's side of the driveway.

Medical Emergency Clearance:

Our Contractor will be handling all snow clearing for medical emergencies. The Health Care Center prepares a listing of the medical emergencies after verifying all appointments. Priorities for snow clearance for medical emergencies are *only* given to residents who have a *verifiable* appointment for one of the following:

1. Dialysis
2. Chemotherapy
3. Radiation therapy
4. Scheduled Surgery
5. Home Health Aides for the Seriously Disabled

Consideration will also be given to Meals on Wheels, Visiting Nurses and Hospice Teams.

Communications Protocol During the Storm:

The protocol that Management will be following for all snow events is outlined below. Snow Clearance Procedures are also on the Clearbrook Website. You can view it by going to www.clearbrook-nj.com and logging in. Next, go to "Resources" on the main website menu and click on the "Documents and Forms" link. The snow clearance procedure is located under "Emergency Procedures" including "Snow Procedures" link.

• Once the snow stops, the snow contractor will communicate all Section plowing updates to Management. Upon receipt of the updates, Management will send out an email blast, update the website and post the updates on the electronic bulletin board (Channel 26).

These updates will also be communicated from Management to the VOC volunteers and broadcasted every three hours on Channel 26 until the VOC goes off the air.

- Management will continue to provide updates via email blast, the website and the electronic bulletin board every three hours until midnight, resuming the following morning.
- Per the snow procedures, residents should not report driveways or walkways missed until the section is complete. Once Management and the VOC have reported the section being complete, any missed driveways or walkways should be reported directly to the Administration office at (609) 664-5517. The missed driveway or walkway will then be communicated directly to the snow contractor. In addition, all emails concerning snow removal after a storm need to be directed to the following email address: snow@clearbrook-nj.com. DO NOT CONTACT THE GATEHOUSE, NURSES' OFFICE OR THE MAINTENANCE OFFICE. THE CLEARBROOK ADMIN OFFICE IS THE CENTRAL POINT OF CONTACT TO REPORT SNOW-RELATED ISSUES FOR SNOW OCCURRENCES DURING THE WEEK AND ON WEEK-ENDS.
- This process will be followed for snow events occurring Monday through Friday or over the weekend.

Advisory to Residents:

1. Prior to a storm, make sure you have adequate supplies: food, batteries, medications and a good book.
2. Residents should remain calm – your property will be plowed, and you will gain access from your home.
3. Watch Channel 26 or the website for updates from the VOC volunteers after the snow stops.
4. Do not report that your driveway or walkway was missed until the VOC reports that your area is completed.
5. Do not call the nurses or the gatehouse for snow information; they do not have information on the location of the plows. Their phone lines must be kept open for emergencies only.
6. Most important, be patient. Understand that during a snowstorm, the people running the plows and shoveling are trying their best to get the job done as fast as they can, working through the night and under extremely cold conditions.
7. For your safety, please do not stand behind any equipment as the operator cannot see or hear you. All snow-related resident communications should follow the protocol outlined above.
8. **If there is a real emergency – you must dial 911** –not the nurse or the gatehouse.


