

Currently there are two bills pending in the New Jersey Legislature to limit the number of "rentals" in adult communities. The Presidents' Council is supporting this effort and will be sending out the letter below in the near future to:

Senator Linda Greenstein Assemblyman

Daniel Benson Assemblyman Wayne DeAngelo

Many of your constituents are those, like us over 55, who currently live in Active Adult Communities in New Jersey.

Clearbrook, our condo community in Monroe Township, is supporting legislation recently introduced to limit renters in our adult communities.

A bit of background: Clearbrook was built almost 50 years ago. The reason rentals were introduced – it was a way for the builder to expeditiously unload excess inventory. He allowed renters

It was because of this that the Master Deed for the community, written at that time, allowed for rentals. New legislation would override this Master Deed.

Now, some 50 years later, many of our Section presidents would like to limit residents being able to rent out their units. Over the years, we have found that renters are:

- Not able to vote therefore limiting our pool of residents to establish quorums.
- Not able to volunteer on our Boards so we don't have enough volunteers.
- · Not psychologically or financially invested in the prop-

Currently, we are aware that the CAI-NJ Legislative Action Committee is in the process of trying to pass this

bill that permits associations to limit the number of rentals in a community. We are confident that many adult communities in New Jersey would also subscribe to this idea.

We ask for your support for this new legislation.

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Nurse's Notes

Skin Cancer Awareness

Skin care is important all year round, but particularly so when we are outdoors in the milder weather. We shed protective layers of clothing and spend more time outdoors enjoying warm weather activities, increasing our exposure to the leading cause of skin cancer, the sun.

Skin reflects only 5% of sunlight. The other 95% is absorbed or scattered in the skin's deeper layers. While we may think a sun kissed look is healthy, in reality, it is our skin's response to overexposure to the sun. Tanning, burning, blistering and peeling causes short term damage to the skin. Over the long term, that damage accumulates and can lead to freckling. loss of elasticity, wrinkling, breaking of small blood vessels, precancerous lesions and eventually skin can-cer.

90% of all skin cancers are the result of long-term exposure to the sun's ultra-violet or UV, radiation, and the most damaging effects occur before age 18. Mil-lions of Americans develop skin cancer annually making it the most common form of can-

Basal Cell Carcinoma, or BCC, forms in the basal cells that line the deepest layers of the epidermis, the top layer of skin and accounts for about 80% percent of all skin cancers. BCC usually appears on the nose, cheeks, forehead and ears, but can be found anywhere there has been significant exposure to the sun.

Squamous cell carcinoma, SCC, attacks the squamous cells that line the top layer of skin. It is the second most common form of skin cancer, accounting for about 15% of all diagnoses. A bald scalp, ears, face, neck and the lower lip are sites where SCC is most likely to develop. While these cancers appear mainly on sun exposed areas, they can show up anywhere on the body.

The third type of skin cancer is malignant melanoma, which grows in the melanocytes, the cells that give color to our skin. Malignant melanoma accounts for only about 5% of all skin cancers. but it is the most deadly. It is estimated that 207,390 cases were diagnosed and 7,180 died of this in 2021. Malignant melanoma is seen in men more frequently than women. It is most commonly found on the trunk in men and on the legs in women. Light skinned individuals with a history of severe blistering sunburns, numerous atypical looking moles and a family or personal history of melanoma are at a higher risk for developing melanomas.

You're at higher risk for developing any type of skin cancer when you have a family history, fair skin, red or blonde hair, light colored eyes, freckling on the upper back and a history of three or more blistering sunburns before the age of 20. In addition, three or more outdoor summer jobs before the age of 20, a ten-dency to burn and an inability to tan increase your risk. The time of day you spend outdoors (sun is strongest between 10am and 4pm), your geographic location and the condition of the ozone layer are also contributing risk factors.

Early detection and treatment can lead to a cure for most skin cancers, even melanoma. To help protect yourself you need to learn your ABCs. A stands for

asymmetry. A normal mole is symmetrical so be concerned if a mole has an irregular shape. B is for border. The borders of a normal mole are usually even and regular, while a malignant melanoma has irregular, scalloped borders. B also stands for bleeding. A normal mole will not bleed unless it is traumatized, while melanomas often bleed with little trauma. C is for color. Normal moles should be uniform in color. If you notice a mole that differs in color from others on your skin, be suspicious. In addition, melanomas tend to be multicolored they often have red, black, brown, black, blue or white in them. Color may also spread from the edges of their borders. D is for diameter. Malignant melano-

Clearbrook **Computer Group**

In a previous column I discussed Artificial Intelligence, Al. It's a challenging concept somewhat elusive to most people, but proving to be insidiously invasive to all branches of technology.

Presently Artificial intelligence is in productivity apps and video games; it's writing blog posts and software; it's conducting conversations and designing computer chips. Right now, it feels as though AI is an unstoppable force, but scientists at Johns Hopkins University believe one thing might overpower it. It's called organoid intelligence, or OI, and it uses human brain cells to make computing more brain-like. OI uses organoids, clusters of living tissue grown from stem cells as biological hardware to power systems of algorithms. The hope is that it will provide more advanced learning than conventional computers thus resulting in better decision-making than Al can provide. For OI to produce desired outcomes each organoid would have to hold 10 million cells. At that point it could handle close to 600 trillion bits. Today's fastest computer can handle about 240 billion bits. Using human brain cells to power computers has obvious ethical implications. Researchers

mas tend to be larger than six millimeters, the size of the head of a pencil eraser. However, a smaller mole that changes in size or shape is also cause for concern. E stands for elevation. Any mole that grows and raises itself off the surface of the skin should be viewed with suspicion. F is for feeling. If a mole is painful or itchy, investigate it. A change in the appearance, shape or color of a mole or spot is always cause for concern. If you have any questions at all about a spot on your body, have your doctor check it immediately or schedule an appointment with a dermatologist. Prevention is key! Remember that the sun's damaging rays penetrate through water, clouds and shade. Overcast skies reduce ultraviolet rays by only 20%, and shade reduces UV exposure by only 50%.

People who reach the age of 65 can expect to live, on average, two more dec-ades. This means that efforts to improve the use of sun protection and reduce sunburn among older adults would likely help to reduce skin cancer risk in later decades of life. Recent research shows that only about 15% of older adults and 8% of sun -sensitive older adults regularly used multiple types of sun protection.

Make sure you wear sun protection to provide a barrier against damaging rays of the sun. Use sunscreens with a sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 30 to provide a barrier against the

damaging rays of the sun. Choose a broad-spectrum sunscreen that protects against UVA (long-wave rays that penetrate the skin more deeply) and UVB (more potent short-wave rays that cause sunburn) radiation. Apply sunscreen 30 minutes before you go outside and reapply every two hours, especially if you're swimming or in the sun for extended period of time. Also minimize exposure between the hours of 10am and 4pm when the sun is highest in the sky. Wear tightly woven fabrics and darker colors that will not reflect light onto your face and wear a hat.

The most popular kinds of sun protection among older men were wearing clothing to the ankles, such as pants (44%) and staying in the shade (37%). The most popular kinds of sun protection among older women were staying in the shade (47%) and using sunscreen (32%).

Also note that certain medications can increase photosensitivity to UV rays. Check with your doctor and pharmacist and read all medication labels, especially those on prescription drugs. Absolutely avoid tanning beds. The UV radiation they emit are more intense than the sun.

Finally examine your skin every month, beginning at the top of your head and finishing at your toes. Use mirrors to check difficult to see places such as your back. If you see any changes or notice a new spot make an appointment right away with your health care provider or dermatologist.

would have to monitor development of OI for signs of consciousness. In addition, there are concerns about protecting stem cell donors' privacy.

The Internet Explorer Browser is gone. Microsoft stopped all support for IE in January. Unfortunately there are still businesses and even government agencies using web-based systems that can only function in Internet Explorer. Many organizations spent huge sums in creating complex web applications in IE. Of course, that was when IE had 90% browser market share. These same organization may not have had the time or budget to rewrite their systems for today's browsers. Microsoft has permanently disabled Internet Explorer. If you need to use IE in Windows 10 or Windows 11, the way to get it is through Internet Explorer mode in the Microsoft Edge browser. To get sites that require IE to work inside Edge click on the three-dot menu on the right side of the top menu bar. Choose Settings which is nearly at the bottom of the resulting menu. Choose the Default browser item from the Settings list in the right-hand panel. This opens the Internet Explorer Compatibility dialog box. Select the Allow option for the "Allow sites to be reloaded in Internet Explorer Mode (IE mode)" setting. Restart the browser to apply the settings and load legacy website addresses correctly.

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

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

This information will be submitted to Administration, who in turn reports it to JCP&L, and hopefully the bulbs are replaced in a timely fashion. We will also make note of the date each light is fixed. This can be a problem and in some cases a hazardous situation.

We have one extremely large tree that has to come down since the overgrown roots have now cracked an underground pipe. We cannot fix the piping until the tree is removed. There are also two or three dead trees behind our fence along Applegarth Road that Section 3 has to have cut down. According to Monroe Township, a tree cannot be cut down unless it is dead, diseased, or has created underground problems.

The Section's Board Member elections will be held on May18 at 2:30 pm in Lounge B. You will be receiving in your Absentee Ballot soon for this election.

Here is the process for anyone experiencing plumbing / hot water heating issues within their unit. Call a plumber. Below are names of plumbers the Section has used in the past:

If, and only if, the plumber is unable to clear the problem, then you may call the Board to follow up.

Please remember to put your cars in the garage if the forecast is snow. The snow removal vendor will not clear your driveways (if the cars are parked in the driveway. Also, remember that the CCA provides Calcium Chloride pellets that you can pick up from either the Clubhouse parking lot or the Cultural Center parking lot to protect your driveways from icing. Please do not use Sodium Chloride, because it invalidates our driveway warranties.

When walking your dogs, please remember to pick up after them, especially in the common areas. Additionally, when you see garbage in the streets, please take the time to pick it up and place it in a garbage can. Let's keep our streets and neighborhood

Maintenance requests

If you have maintenance requests, please fill out a Section 8 - Work Assignment Sheet. Unless it is an emergency, please do not call because we do not want verbal requests. We use the Work Assignment Sheet as an audit trail. These forms are now located in the file room of the Administration Building/Clubhouse - on the right hand side in the center cubby. They can also be returned to the same location. The form is also available on the Clearbrook-NJ.com website. You need to LOG-IN, (if you don't have your password information, follow the prompts). Section 11 Annual Election - The Section 11, 2023, Annual Meeting will be held May 16 at 7 pm, in the Clubhouse Lounge B. The meeting will last until all legally cast ballots have been counted, both those cast at the meeting or received as absentee ballots by the CCA Admin office by 5 p.m., on May 15. We currently have all nine Board seats filled, with three, 3-year term seats expiring at the May 16 meeting.

Whereas the Open Board Meetings are for the purpose of conducting official board business, the purpose of the Annual Meeting of Unit Owners is to conduct the official business of the 99 Unit Owners, most notably the election to fill Board vacancies and passage of resolutions that modify governing documents (e.g., Section By-laws.)

The quorum for a Unit Owner Election meeting is 15%. This means that at least 15% of the Section's eligible units must cast ballots at the meeting or by submission of absentee ballots. If you think you may not be able to attend the Annual Meeting, please vote by absentee ballot to help assure that our quorum number is met.

Board Reorganization Meeting - Each year, following the Annual Election, the newly constituted Board will meet the following week to hold its Reorganization Meeting. At this meeting the Board will elect its officers, consisting of President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary. A Recording Secretary will be appointed, as well as Committee Chairs as needed. These leadership positions are elected by the Board members to serve a one year term.

Our Newest Section 11 Neighbors - Section 11 did not gain any new neighbors in January or February this year. However, in March, the home at 452C Closter Rd... previously owned by Lois Silverman, was purchased by David and Ann Rojas and they began moving in immediately. If you have a chance, please give David and Ann a friendly welcome to our Malden Village neighborhood.

Unexpected water shutoff - Last month, several Section 11 residents unexpectedly had their water service abruptly shut off. Here is a brief explanation as to why this happened.

Section 11 has 5 water meters, each of which services approximately 20 units. When water had to be temporarily shut off to one of those meters due to an installation of a replacement water heater, the Monroe Township Utility Department (MTUD) was contacted to obtain a list of all units that are serviced by that particular water meter. All residents on that list were notified the day before the scheduled shutoff.

However, when MTUD did shut off the meter, it was discovered that only 19 of the 20 units scheduled for the shutoff lost water service and that the one unit needing the shutoff was not shutoff. When the MTUD quickly realized the problem, it began to shutoff the other four meters to determine which of them was servicing the unit needing the water heater replacement.

While the defective water heater was successfully replaced on the scheduled date, it was not without unpleasantly surprising some Section 11 residents. The Section 11 Board regrets that circumstances did not afford our Board time to notify its residents in advance of the MTUD's quick action to resolve the shutoff problem.

I am certainly enjoying the added daylight, and I understand there is a bill in the New Jersey State Legislature to go to permanent Daylight Saving time. It would mean that this fall we may not "fall back.

Trapping and cleanup are costly, so we ask homeowners to be vigilant if you notice areas such as under soffits where the raccoons have chewed away enough material to allow entry into an attic. Also check siding periodically as squirrels can get in that way.

Landscape season is in full swing. So why are homeowners asked to complete a Landscape Modification Request before planting in the three-foot area around their homes? One just has to drive around the community to see trees and shrubs that were never meant to be in such a small space and in some cases are now taller than the unit, with roots growing under foundations.

It's a good idea to periodi-

cally inspect washing machine hoses to ensure they are not leaking. If it's time to replace your hose, replace with a metal type of hose. Make sure the drain hose is secured in the pipe.

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Mayor Dalina: Proposed State Budget Adds Million in Additional funds to benefit Monroe Taxpayers

I reached out to Governor Murphy last month, as I did this time last year, to ensure his proposed fiscal '23/24 budget focuses on affordability and provides more property tax relief to Monroe residents.

I am doing everything I can to hold the line on taxes in the municipal budget, but we need the state to be a partner in affordability.

Inflation is a challenge for our residents and I asked the Governor to continue to invest in helping residents with property tax relief. I highlighted the need to increase state school funding again this year and do even more

to maintain and expand property tax relief programs for our residents.

I am pleased to report that the proposed budget includes many items I am fighting for on your behalf.

Monroe learned today that 2023-24 school funding from the State is proposed to increase by almost \$1.6 million, a 16% increase. Monroe has been woefully underfunded by the state and received as little as \$2.9 million just six years ago.

I went to Trenton with many others in 2017 when Senate Bill 2, the most recent school funding formula, was passed.

Since that time, Monroe's aid increased to almost \$9.6 Million in 2022.

With an additional \$1.6 million, we will reach \$11.2 million in State Aid for the first time for the schools.

While we deserve an even better funding formula, this increase and the previous five years of increases, has helped our efforts to stabilize property taxes for all Monroe residents.

I will continue to fight on this school funding issue and work with our 14th District legislators to ensure this \$1.6 million remains in the final state budget bill.

The Governor is also renewing the Anchor Rebate program which provides up to \$1,500 to homeowners who earn less \$250,000. This program would be re-

newed for 2024. According to the State, checks from last year's program may arrive as early as this month.

The Governor is also proposing to expand the Senior Freeze program next year. We fought to expand the income eligibility for this program two years ago. In his budget announcement for this year, the Governor will further expand the successful Senior Freeze property tax relief program next year increasing income eligibility to \$150,000 and removing roadblocks to eligibility. That means additional property tax relief in 2024 for 50,000 more seniors.

I have been fighting for years for the residents of Monroe. My list of top priorities has included: increased school aid, expanding the Homestead Rebate that has now been replaced by the Anchor Property Tax Relief program that now applies to even more residents, higher Senior Freeze income eligibility, larger state retirement income exemptions, veterans tax credits and much more.

Monroe residents deserve our fair share of state funding to help keep property taxes stable again this year.

I pledge to continue my efforts to serve the people of Monroe, ensuring a safe and affordable community with services and resources beyond compare for years to come.

"Scent of a Woman"). At the center of the program is the music of Tango's greatest composer - Piazzolla.


