If the repair cannot be done by in-house personnel, it will be left for repair in 2024. Understanding the CCA and Sections

With the CCA elections approaching, it's important to have a complete understanding of what the CCA is responsible for and how it differs from the sections.

The CCA and the 18 Sections here are all separate corporations, each with their own services, governing documents, elected boards, and finances. Each unit owner is a member of the CCA and also a member of the section in which their unit is located. While the CCA is considered a master association, the Sections are all condominium associations.

The CCA is responsible for maintaining all the common elements of the community and recreational facilities and services such as the Clubhouse, Cultural Center and amenities, which the CCA board oversees (and has hired Taylor Management Company to maintain). Each Section is responsible for maintaining the common elements of the condominiums such as the roofs, siding, driveways, property, etc. The Section Boards oversee and maintain these common elements. The Sections have formally delegated some maintenance responsibilities to the CCA, such as landscaping and roads.

So, the CCA and the Sections each maintain different areas of the community and one does not generally govern the other.



Influenza Season Is Coming! Protect Yourself; Get Your Influenza Vaccine!

Influenza is a virus that can involve fevers, fatigue, and body aches. The severity of the virus depends on what other medical conditions you have. Influenza can be dangerous and sometimes fatal, so it is important to protect yourself as much as possible from this virus.

Get the Influenza Vaccine

Saint Peter's University Hospital will be hosting two influenza vaccination clinics in your community. The best time to get your influenza shot is in early fall—from late September to early October. Please be on the lookout for the Saint Peter's flyer announcing when and where the clinics will be held.

Nurses from Saint Peter's Community Health Services will be administering both the quadrivalent and the highdose vaccines. Please speak with your doctor to determine which vaccine is best for you before you make an appointment to come to a Saint Peter's influenza vaccination clinic.

Frequently Asked Questions about Influenza & the Influenza Vaccine Q. What is seasonal influenza?

A: Influenza is a virus that is very contagious. It affects the respiratory system, targeting the nose and throat all the way to the lungs. It is passed by tiny droplets that are produced when a person coughs or sneezes.

Someone who is infected may experience fever and/or chills, body aches, tiredness, sore throat, headaches, and a cough. A person may be infected with the influenza virus for a day or two before any symptoms appear, but they are still contagious during this time.

Q: How does influenza differ from COVID-19?

A. While influenza and COVID-19 are both respiratory viruses, there are some differences in the symptoms and the length of time it takes to recover. Both viruses are spread the same way, but COVID-19 tends to be more contagious.

A person who contracts COVID-19 tends to be contagious for a longer period than a person who has influenza. This is because symptoms come on more slowly with COVID-19 than influenza.

Q. Who should get the influenza vaccine?

A. Everyone over the age of 6 months should get the influenza vaccine. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) highly recommends that pregnant women and people who have a weak immune system or chronic illness should get this vaccine once every season.

It's very important to discuss influenza and your personal health risks with your doctor so you know which vaccine is the best for you. Your doctor will take your age into consideration when making this decision.

Remember, if you are a caregiver for someone who is considered high-risk like an infant, an elderly individual, or someone who has a chronic illness, you should get the influenza vaccine if you are able to do so.

Q. Who shouldn't get the influenza vaccine?

A. The influenza vaccine is not recommended for people younger than six months old. Additionally, if you have had a severe allergic reaction to any of the products used to manufacture the vaccine or if you have had a previous lifethreatening allergic reaction to the influenza vaccine, do not get it. It is important to

speak to your doctor to find out what is best for you.

Q. Can I get sick from the influenza vaccine?

A. No, it is not possible to get sick from the influenza vaccine.

The influenza vaccine is developed using the inactive virus. In other words, it is not alive and can't make you

There is a "live" vaccine that is sprayed into the nose. However, this spray vaccine is made from virus particles that have been significantly weakened. This is done to protect people who get this form of influenza vaccine from getting sick.

It is important to remember that the nasal spray influenza

vaccine is only recommended for people ages 2 to 49. Pregnant women and people with weak immune systems or chronic conditions should not take the nasal spray form of the influenza vaccine.

Q. What side effects might I develop after getting the influenza vaccine?

A. Some people experience no side effects after the influenza vaccine. However, many patients who get the influenza vaccine do experience some mild effects including fatigue, headache, chills, fever, or soreness at the injection site. This is your body mounting an immune response to the virus and this is a completely normal reaction.

Q. If I get influenza, what can I do to feel better?

A. If you get influenza, there are several medications that may help you minimize your symptoms and lower any risk of developing serious complications. These drugs work best when started within one to two days of your first symptoms. See your doctor when vou are not feeling well to give yourself the best chance at recovering from influenza as quickly as possible.



Microsoft views running Windows 11 from the cloud as a long-term priority. This idea was formulated in June of 2022 when the company set out its goals for a variety of its businesses. Microsoft has already enabled this capability for Windows 365, which the company introduced in 2021. It lets you run Windows 11 from the cloud to a device such as a lowerspec PC, tablet, or smartphone, but the service is currently geared for commercial businesses. That could change. Microsoft wants to expand Windows 365 to enable a full Windows operating system streamed from the cloud to any device. This could be a problem for consumers since a cloud-based Windows experience could force users to pay a recurring fee for the OS. In addition, it would require PC's to be online continuously. Although these plans were developed more than a year ago there hasn't been any recent mention of its effect on consumers. It may be that Microsoft would direct a cloud-based windows 11 to niche-based operations. Last month Microsoft released Windows 365 Boot a way to automatically sign into Windows 365 on a PC without needing to sign into the local OS.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is

making inroads into the space program. Shades of Star Trek. NASA engineers are developing a ChatGPTinspired interface that will let astronauts communicate seamlessly with their spacecraft. Mission controllers will be able to engage in conversations with Al-powered robots and computer systems as they embark on exploratory missions across space on their own. The desire is to get to a point where there will be conversational interactions with space vehicles. Initial launch of the NASA chatbot project will be on Lunar Gateway. This is the upcoming space station designed for extraterrestrial operations within the Artemis Moon program.

The DuckDuckGo browser offers a level of privacy well above most mainstream browsers. It has been available on many other platforms and a Widows version has just been released. This is a Beta version so it is still under development. The DuckDuckGo browser for Windows comes in the form of an app and, as such, does not install in the normal manner. After installing, you won't find a new folder in Program Files; instead, it will be listed among the apps in Settings. It also adds a shortcut to the Start menu. Upon completing the installation there is a prompt that allows importing bookmarks and passwords from other brows-

The members also heard from Council President, Miriam Cohen, and Council Vice President Terry Van Dzura, and the focus shifted to the upcoming November elections and the need to increase the Democrat representation at all levels of New Jersey government in order to help ensure the protection for women's rights, lower drug costs, and keep the focus on the needs of New Jersey residents. 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



Nobody likes going to the doctor. But at our age, it's a little bit more important than it was 20 years earlier.

These hospitals house some of the very latest in technology and qualified physicians to help pa-

Getting a physical at least once a year as we age has been the recommended practice for several decades. The rationale has been that routine checkups can help you stay healthy and reduce your risk of getting sick. Screening tests, performed during a regular physical exam can let a doctor catch any risk factors or diseases early. When you catch these early, they are much more treatable, and your chances

of recovery are greater. I know of several friends and neighbors that this has indeed benefited.

However, there is now an interesting trend emerging saying that an annual physical is not the best approach. Things change with the times. Aging Care is an online newsletter which recently published the follow-

"An article published by Consumer Reports examined the most popular preventative measure Americans take - annual physicals. In it, researchers and doctors agree that, for most people, annual check-ups are a waste of time and money. Furthermore, the yearly visits often lead to unnecessary and risky follow-up procedures, such as blood tests, EKGs, and chest X-rays."

Doctors from the American College of Physicians, the American Medical Association and the Society of General Internal Medicine are now emphasizing the importance of personalized, preventative medical care, visits and tests based on a person's gender, age, health, as well as family history.

Work with your doctor if you exhibit any symptoms of pain or discomfort or have risk factors to find out what tests they suggest. And whatever you decide to do, most researchers and doctors do recommend you get following tests/ screenings when needed:

- Blood Pressure Check: All over 18
- Cervical Cancer Screen: Women 21-65
- Lipid Panel (Cholesterol): Men over 35, Women over
- Diabetes Test: Overweight Individuals
- Mammogram: Women 50-
- · Colorectal Cancer Screening: All 50-75

Our next Open Board Meeting is scheduled for September 19 at 7 p.m. in the Clubhouse Lounge B. All Section 11 unit owners and residents are welcome to attend these meetings. Your participation in these meeting gives you the opportunity to have an input into the Section 11 Board of Directors decisions and plans and to get to meet more of your neighbors.

Maintenance Responsibility Chart - The Section 11 Master Deed provides a legal statement of what comprises Section 11 property (i.e., common elements) and are collectively owned by the 99 Section 11 unit owners (1/99th of Section 11 common elements per unit owner). These include all elements not specifically defined by the Master Deed as being part of a unit and, therefore, not individually owned by a unit owner (e.g., all grounds, buildings, streets) and what

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

comprises a unit (e.g., all interior space and interior fixtures) as well as a few elements not in the interior (e.g., air conditioning equipment). The Master Deed specifies in legal terms that the Section has responsibility for maintenance of the common elements, while the unit owner is responsible for maintaining the unit.

What this means to a unit owner is expressed more specifically in the Section 11 Maintenance Responsibility Chart. This chart divides a large set of typical maintenance responsibilities between Unit Owner and Section 11. They are listed alphabetically, in a table format, to make them easy to find. If you have not already received a copy of this chart or if yours is missing, contact any Section 11 Board Member or call this writer at 609-955-1531. Please keep this chart in a handy location so you can quickly answer most of your questions about which maintenance items are unit owner responsibility and which are assigned to the Section. Use this chart to make sure you are not paying for a repair that the Section would have paid.

Remember to Think Water Conservation - Climate change seems to have brought us quite a bit of rain this spring. While most of us with sprinkler systems have had them turned on by now, we have seldom needed to use them. Summer will likely change this picture. Don't forget, while you don't write a check to the water company every month, your share of the Section's water bill is paid from your monthly maintenance fees. If you waste water, you are penalizing yourself and your neighbors. Think and act conservatively when using water. Don't bother watering lawns and shrubs if the ground is already soaked. Much of the added water will just run off into the streets or evaporate. and the excess water may harm your plants and grass. Of course, watering during a rain storm is pointless and costly. Please, if your sprinkler system does not have a rain sensor, have one installed. If you water your lawn at night, which is generally recommended, you may not know when rainfall is causing you to waste sprinkler water. But, the rain sensor will and it will turn of your sprinklers.

Drippy Faucet? If you hear water mysteriously running through pipes in your unit, it is likely water is being wasted by a faulty toilet, dripping interior faucet or shower head. The Clearbrook Maintenance team can economically diagnose and repair most such water wasting problems for you. If you notify a Section board member when you find an outside bibcock dripping, the repair will be paid for by the Section.

Pesky pests and bugs

bugging you? If you're experiencing a problem with pesky pests, call the CCA Admin Office (609-655-2706) to report this problem. The CCA has a contract with a NJ company, Anchor Pest Control. The CCA will arrange an exterminator appointment for you with Anchor to rid your unit of the troublesome pests at no direct cost to you. The contract with Anchor includes treatments for a broad array of vermin including ants, bees, wasps, spiders, roaches, termites, and other vermin. including mice.

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
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

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
